2. APPROVAL BYE LAW 10 CHANGE

New paragraph (iii) to clarify that the transfer process (and not re-approval) for subsequent move requests. Change to (i) & (ii) to be consistent with Bye Law 9 which governs all Transfers, Permissions to Play, and Approvals – and to be consistent with Official Guide Rule 6.8 (C).

- i. A player from a GAA Club that exclusively plays football may play hurling with another GAA Club provided that a fully completed approval form is signed by the player and the Secretary of both Clubs. That approval form is processed by the Meath Competitions Control Committee for decision by the Meath County Committee subject to approval by Central Council. In the event of the Club Secretary not signing the approval form, the Meath C.C.C. shall consider the application and decide.
- ii. A player from a GAA Club that exclusively plays hurling may play football with another GAA Club provided that a fully completed approval form is signed by the player and the Secretary of both Clubs. That approval form is processed by the Meath Competitions Control Committee for decision by the Meath County Committee subject to approval by Central Council. In the event of the Club Secretary not signing the approval form, the Meath C.C.C. shall consider the application and decide.
- iii. Once a player has received approval under (i) or (ii) above, and has legally participated in Club Competition with the approved club, he shall be governed by the provisions of the County's Transfer Byelaw for any subsequent request to move club within the county.

3. Grading Bye law

Rationale - To avoid players coming on for short periods in a championship game, because of injuries to key players or otherwise, and finding themselves without football for the rest of the year. With the separation of first and non-first teams, no first team will ever be disadvantaged by such a bye law and games development is advanced.

"A County Committee may, in its Bye-Law, allow for a Player to be re-graded by more than one level during a Championship Year, provided that:

(1) He has not played in a higher Championship Grade in that Championship Year. However, a County, through its Bye Laws, may make provision for a player to be regraded during that Championship year subject to any guidelines issued by Central Council"
