MISSION STATEMENT

To manage and promote the aims of C.L.G. and to continue to provide enhanced facilities and structures for our patrons.

Tá an-áthas orm thuairisc mar runaí ar Choiste Contae na Mí a chur i láthair anseo anocht. I am delighted to present my final report as Secretary of Meath Co. Board to you tonight.

Covid 19 was still with us at the beginning of the year, but the O'Byrne and Kehoe Cups returned in January. Neither of our senior teams got much of a break but everyone was glad to get back to some sort of normality.

We had a mixed year both on and off the pitch. We had some great moments, especially our minor football team winning the Seamus Heaney cup by beating Wexford in the final and our minor hurling team winning the Peadar O Liathain Cup by beating Carlow in dramatic fashion. A young lady, Sara Ní Chonaill, from Clann na nGael won the All Ireland Scór na nÓg solo singing. What a proud day that was for her family, Club and our Scór committee. Well done.

More memorable days came when the Meath Ladies became All-Ireland champions for the 2^{nd} time by beating Kerry in Croke Park on 31^{st} July -10 months after they won their 1^{st} All Ireland. The ladies had already beaten Donegal in the National League Div 1 Final.

After Páirc Tailteann was announced as grounds of the year for 2021 we had to settle for joint 2nd (with Semple stadium) behind Páirc Ui Chaoimh for 2022. This was a great result again for our County grounds. Thank you to John McBride and staff for all their hard work keeping the pitch in immaculate condition. A total of 19 games have been played in Páirc Tailteann in November alone between schools and Leinster Club games. This would not have been possible without the maintenance schedule being adhered to.

Senior Football

Andy McEntee stepped down as manager of the senior football team in June. At this stage I would like to thank Andy for the 6 years he dedicated to the team and wish him the best of luck with his next venture in Antrim. Thank you also to all his selectors and backroom team. I would like to wish Colm O'Rourke, manager, and his selectors the best of luck going forward in 2023.

O'Byrne Cup: - We got a walkover in the first round of the O'Byrne Cup. Wicklow had Covid in their camp and were unable to travel.

We travelled to Stradbally to play Laois and were beaten on a score of 0 - 09 to 1 - 12. We then played our final game against Wexford in Ashbourne and beat them 1 - 15 to 1 - 10. However, Laois qualified out of our group.

National League: - We started our league campaign with an away game against Galway in Salthill. We were beaten by 0-6 to 1-14 on one of the worst days, weather wise. We then played Roscommon in Páirc Tailteann the following week but unfortunately, we were beaten 1 - 11 to 1 - 15. It was a tense affair and we had 2 people red carded. We had our next game two weeks later against Down in Navan where we played out a 2 - 6 each draw. We went to Tullamore the following week and drew with Offaly 1 - 10 each. Two weeks later we played Cork in Navan and came away with a 1 - 18 to 1 - 10 win. It was a much-needed result, and no more than our team deserved. We then headed to Ennis and came away with a victory on a score line of 0 - 10 to 0 - 9. As a result, we retained our Division 2 status. Our last league game was against Derry in Páirc Tailteann where we lost 2 - 11 to 1 - 16.

Leinster S.F.C.: - We played Wicklow in the quarter final of the Leinster Championship in Páirc Tailteann on 1^{st} May. We had a great win 4-13 to 1-12. We then played Dublin in the semifinal on 15^{th} May in Croke Park. We were badly beaten 1-14 to 1-27. We had two players red carded in the 2^{nd} half. It was a day to forget. We appealed the red cards and one of the players had his rescinded. We still had a chance in the qualifiers when we drew Clare away in Ennis. However, it was not to be. We lost 1-09 to 1-11.

As I stated earlier Andy McEntee, his selectors and backroom personnel stood down a few days after this game. The days and weeks that followed were the worst time I recall during my five years as Secretary. The abuse and vitriol from so called supporters was disgraceful. People should remember the amount of time and commitment given by the players, manager, selectors, backroom personnel, and administrators is enormous. We are all volunteers who have put so much time and energy into the betterment of Meath GAA. Unfortunately, success eluded us, but it does not give anyone the right to verbally abuse us. I now wish that more respect is shown in future.

Senior Hurling

Nick Weir stepped down as manager of the senior hurlers when the season ended. Thank you to Nick and his management team for their work with the senior hurlers. Welcome to Seoirse Bulfin and his management team and best of luck in 2023.

Kehoe Cup: - We started our Kehoe Cup campaign against Westmeath in Dunganny and were beaten on a score line of 0 - 16 to 1 - 21. Our next game was against Carlow in Kilmessan. Unfortunately, we were beaten by 0 - 19 to 2 - 22. Our final game was against Kildare, but they gave a walkover because we would play them in the 1^{st} round of the league.

National League: - We played Kildare in Newbridge on 6th February and won by 0 -18 to 0 - 15. The following week we lost to Down in Trim on a score line of 1-19 to 2-18.

This is a game we should have won. We were back in Trim two weeks later where we played Westmeath who beat us 1-15 to 4-23. The following week we had the long journey again to Tralee. We were beaten by 0-14 to 2-31. Our last game was in Páirc Tailteann against Carlow. We were beaten on a score line of 1-21 to 2-21 after a tremendous battle. Unfortunately, we were relegated to Div 2B.

Joe McDonagh Cup: - After the heroics of 2021 we competed in the Joe McDonagh Cup again in 2022. We played our 1^{st} game against Carlow in Páirc Tailteann on 16^{th} April. We lost 0-17 to 4-30. The following week we went to Tullamore to play Offaly but again we came away having lost by 0-19 to 2-22. We had a player sent off at the beginning of the second half which didn't help our cause. We unfortunately, had to set off for Tralee again the following week. We were comprehensively beaten. We played Antrim in Páirc Tailteann and Down in Ballycran and lost both of those games. We were demoted to the Christy Ring Cup.

Unfortunately, we had lost a lot of players from 2021 and hadn't much time to prepare for 2022. Hopefully, the coming year we will gain promotion again in both the league and championship.

Under 20 Football

John McCarthy came in as manager for 2022. Our 1^{st} outing was in the John Kerins Cup against Dublin in Dunganny on 19^{th} February. We were beaten 0-17 to 2-14. The venue was changed several times due to weather conditions. We played Laois the following week in Clonard. The score that day was 0-8 to 1-6 to Laois. We went to Hawkfield to play Kildare who beat us 1-8 to 2-12. That was our involvement with the John Kerins Cup finished and we had 6 weeks to prepare for the Leinster championship. We played Longford away on 16^{th} April. We won on a score line of 1-11 to 0-13. This result gave us an encounter with Dublin in the Leinster semi-final on 21^{st} April in Parnell Park. Unfortunately, the game didn't go our way and we were beaten 1-14 to 4-12. John McCarthy remains as manager for 2023. I would like to wish John, his selectors and backroom team the best of luck in the coming season.

Under 20 Hurling

Peter Durnin remained as manager of this team for 2022. Our 1^{st} outing was in the League against Offaly in Dunganny on 19^{th} February. We were beaten 0-14 to 0-18. Our next game was against Westmeath which was scheduled for an away venue, but weather conditions brought the game to Dunganny. We were beaten 2-9 to 1-17. Our 3^{rd} game was against Carlow in Kiltale which we won 1-17 to 0-15. That was a great result for our young team. This team only had 2 weeks to prepare for the Leinster championship. Unfortunately, we were beaten by Kildare in Páirc Tailteann 1-12 to 1-18 on 2^{nd} April. This was the 1^{st} round of the Leinster Championship proper which we opted to enter instead of the lower tier championship. Peter Durnin stepped down as manager and we welcome James Andrews as manager for 2023. May I take this opportunity to thank Peter for his involvement with this team and wish James the best of luck in the coming season.

Clubs

Trim won the intermediate football championship in 2021 and went on to win the Leinster Championship. They beat St. Faithleagh of Roscommon in the All-Ireland semi-final and represented the County in the final in Croke Park on 6th February. Unfortunately, they were beaten by Steelstown in the final.

I wish to thank our Club officials for their patience and understanding again this year. Our CCC has worked tirelessly to try to get our games played and at the time of writing most adult competitions are completed. By convention all games will be completed. Unfortunately, because of lack of time and weather conditions the CCC could not complete our knockout competitions. We must commend them for getting as many games played as possible. Well done to John Daly, Damien Griffin, Niamh Regan and their committee. This year, for the first time, the CCC produced a full fixture list for the Championships with dates, times and venues. This gave players and officials certainty on when they could arrange their lives outside the GAA.

Congratulations to all our football championship winners:- SFC Ratoath who won the Keegan Cup, IFC Dunshaughlin who will play senior football again in 2022, JFC Castletown who will play intermediate in 2022. This year we had the Premier championship in nine divisions. All finals were played. Congratulations to all the winners who were Donaghmore/Ashbourne, St. Colmcilles, Duleek/Bellewstown, Ballivor, St. Colmcilles, Bective, Gaeil Colmcille, St. Colmcilles and Duleek/Bellewstown. Congratulations to the following hurling teams who won their championships: Senior –Trim, Intermediate – Dunderry, Junior – St. Peter's Dunboyne, Junior 2 – Kildalkey. Congratulations to Skryne who won the Kilmacud Crokes 7 – a -side competition. Well done also to Wolfe Tones and Clann na nGael who represented the County in the Comortas Peil.

This year, we finally got to have our first Regional competition which was won by Boyne Valley. A motion had been passed at our convention in 2019 but because of Covid no competition took place until this year. All games except for the final were played in Dunganny. It was a great success. Well done to all the managers and selectors and of course the players of the intermediate and junior clubs.

Handball

Kells are once again keeping the flag flying when it comes to Handball. Tom Sheridan and Joe Lynch were winners in the doubles soft ball championship. Michael Sheridan won the singles. Gary McConnell reached the finals of two championships. This weekend Kells won the Inter Club championship. Leinster Club

The Leinster Club championship is ongoing at present. Unfortunately, Ratoath were beaten in the semi-final by The Downs, Westmeath. Dunderry were beaten in the quarter final by St. Feichins, Louth. Dunshaughlin were beaten in the final by St. Mogue's, Fethard, Wexford. **Castletown are Leinster Junior champions.** They beat Addamstown, Wexford in the final. Trim, after a great win against Danesfort, Kilkenny went on to defeat Tullamore in the semi-final. They now play the final against Bray on 10th December.

Ladies Football and Camogie

Hard luck to the Meath Camogie team who were beaten in the All-Ireland semi-final by Galway. Well done to Aoife Minogue on being included in the Rising Stars team.

The Meath Ladies football team won the Div. 1 League and Senior Championship this year. Well done to them on winning 2 in a row and hopefully next year will be as successful. Well done to the ladies who received All Star Awards, but I feel more players also deserved to be honoured.

We have facilitated both codes for training in Dunganny during the year. Both of the teams played league games in Páirc Tailteann this year also.

There is a shortage of referees so I would encourage more people to get involved and ask the clubs to support their referees by providing umpires for them. Thanks to Frank Gallogly and his committee who recruited some new referees this year. However, there is never enough and an appeal for more people to get involved goes out to the Clubs on a regular basis.

Fundraising

Gene Smith is again to the fore front of our fundraising sub-committee. Our Euro millions is still going and hopefully we will get a new syndicate started up shortly. We are still waiting for the big win though. We held a very successful golf classic during the year and our Race Day is back in Fairyhouse again this year. At the time of writing all tables are sold out. Conor Tormey is chairperson of the Race Day committee. They have done a fantastic job. Thank you to all our supporters and sponsors of those two great events.

We issued tickets for all our Championship games and our League finals. This has added extra work for us. I would like to thank Brian Kelly for his assistance with tickets. It is fair to say our revenue is also up as a result. We allowed for people who do not have access to smart phones or computers to pay at the gate. However, this added a lot of extra work for Tara, especially when Clubs did not send in the gate money on time.

Confidentiality

I have continuously spoken about confidentiality. I am concerned that confidential matters are still disclosed to outside parties. There has been a lot of speculation and innuendo about various matters because of the lack of confidentiality.

Dunganny

What would we do without our Centre of Excellence in Dunganny. It is in use every evening and weekend. We had major renovation works carried out on the grass pitches this year. Unfortunately, we do not have an irrigation system, so it took longer to get the pitches back to full use. We received a grant towards three new pitches and hope to start on them in the new year. We also need to upgrade our lights to led lighting. We are in negotiations regarding this at present. Our gym has been upgraded this year. The football development subcommittee contributed towards this expense.

Awards & Presentations

We held a number of presentation nights because no venue could accommodate all our teams. We presented the 2020 minor football team with their Leinster medals at a function in Walterstown. We then presented the 2021 minor football team with their Leinster and All-Ireland medals and the 2021 under 21 hurling team with their All-Ireland medals at a function in Knightsbrook hotel. Finally, we presented the 2022 minor football and hurling teams with their medals at a function in O'Mahony's.

We held our 2020 and 2021 awards night in Castle Arch Hotel in April. We made presentations to Conal Collier, to mark his retirement from the Meath Chronicle and Tara Rowan to mark 25 years of employment with Coiste na Mí. Brendan Cummins and TJ Reilly were the worthy recipients of the Hall of Fame awards.

Resignations

Seamus Kenny resigned from his post as Operations Manager in April. Thank you to Seamus for his work with Coiste na Mí for the last 7 years. Seamus has taken up a new role in Croke Park as National Participation and Programmes Manager. We wish him well in this role. We have just lost Barry Teather to our near neighbours, Louth. Barry was a coach for the past 6 years. He will be sorely missed by our schools and development squads. This week Jamie Queeney, our Games Manager, resigned after spending 10 years with the Coaching and Games section. He goes to pastures new in Leinster Council. Jamie, also, will be a hard act to follow. The turnover of Coaching and Games staff is huge this year. We now have numerous vacancies which we need to get filled in order to continue coaching in our schools.

In Conclusion

I want to thank our Cathaoirleach John Kavanagh, Treasurer Jim Mullery and Assistant Secretary Brian Kelly for their support during the year. I have worked with some wonderful administrators during my five years.

I would like to thank them all for their work and support, particularly Peter O'Halloran and Anne McDonnell. To the rest of management, Paddy Kelly, Gene Smith, Jason Plunkett, Michael Bennett, Cathal Seoighe, Damien Griffin, Martin Blake, Ciaran Flynn, Brian Carberry, Joe O'Brien, Ray Finnegan and Martin O'Halloran a special thank you. I would like to wish the incoming management committee the best of luck for 2023 and especially Ciaran Flynn in his role as Rúnaí.

I would like to thank Tara for all her help and guidance during my five years as Secretary. She is the most efficient person I have dealt with, and I can guarantee that no deadline is broken when she is there. I would also like to thank Olivia and Christina for their assistance. Thank you also to Linda who works in Dunganny and makes sure the place looks well and we all feel safe there. To the ground's maintenance crew of Eugene and Paddy, in Dunganny and Jim Lane in Páirc Tailteann a big thank you.

Thank you to Barry Horgan who is manager of football development. We have now employed Paul Garrigan to work alongside Barry as coach to the development squads. I would like to wish Paul well in his new role.

I wish to thank my club Dunshaughlin for giving me the opportunity of becoming Rúnaí of Coiste na Mí. I have tried my best for the Clubs and County, but the last 4 years have not been easy dealing with resignations and Covid 19. I have enjoyed working with the management and liaison personnel of all our teams over the last five years. Thank you for your co-operation when I looked for training times, team lists, etc over the years.

I have found that not everyone shows respect to the officers or stewards of Coiste na Mí, particularly on match days. The abuse given by some match day personnel towards anyone who asks them to adhere to the rules and regulations has been unacceptable. This abuse has got to stop, or we will have no help on match days. This has been in the minority, but it should not happen again.

I am very disappointed that most Clubs did not nominate people for various posts on management. We have received harsh criticism during the year from some people particularly on social media. The opportunity was given to all Clubs to nominate people and if someone wished to take up an officer role, they should have contacted their Club and seek a nomination. Maybe, it is easier to criticise than to have to take it. I would have liked if more women were nominated for management but unfortunately, we don't seem to have reached that level yet.

I have worked closely with the secretaries of Clubs over the last five years. It was a pleasure to work with you all. I could not have done my job without the co-operation from all of you. The Clubs of Meath are lucky to have such great secretaries working for them.

My final few lines are how I feel we should be going regarding coaching and games. When the go games module was first introduced, I thought it may not work well but I now believe it is one of the best ways for children to participate in our games up to u11. We have some coaching and games staff who work with the Club/School link. We also have development squads from u13 to u16. I feel that instead of having anything up to 240 children training with development squads at u13/u14 and the Clubs congratulating them on making the "team/panel" that coaches should go to the Clubs to help train a full team rather than the perceived best players. It would be much more beneficial to the County if all the children in Clubs could receive some coaching from qualified coaches outside their Club. It could work well if a number of Clubs could be brought together for some training sessions involving all players in a Club, say 13-year-olds or 14 year olds, etc.

Time takes its toll

During the year many of our friends, family and supporters suffered loss through bereavement. I cannot let the occasion pass without a special mention of Ciaran Benville, Chairperson of Coiste na nÓg and Coiste Go Games. Ciaran passed in December 2021. He was an advocate of the Go games structure and worked tirelessly for the betterment of Coiste na Mí. He is sadly missed by us all.

SUB-COMMITTEE REPORTS

CCCC REPORT 2022

We emerged into the spring of 2022 with new beginnings and fresh hope of a not just brighter days after Covid but for a fuller GAA calendar than the previous two before. This was the case in the most part, clubs all-round the county were anxious to get going and play games even though the weather and other factors stalled our initial cup competitions until the league kicked off.

As usual for the CCC committee it's a busy start to the year with many inter club transfers and permission to play requests submitted, along with intense work on reviewing, arranging, rearranging and finally putting together a calendar to put together to be discussed, changed and ratified by the county committee.

The Cup competitions that were sought after games at the start of the year did not get to the finish line, weather and player availability stood in their way, however the leagues and premier competitions for the most part ran successfully.

The fixture dates being released well in advance of time proved a very welcome piece of work, giving clubs and teams ample notice and preparation time ahead of their games.

The appointment of referees to all our games and working with the numbers of referee's we have is indeed a tough ask but much credit goes to Frank Gallogly and the referee's committee for their meticulous attention to detail in their appointments to our games this year. The shortage of referees is a huge issue for the county, it is imperative that clubs discuss this at your club level and do your level best to seek potential referees from your club for 2023.

CHILDREN'S OFFICER COISTE NA MI ANNUAL REPORT 2022

A Chairde Gaeil,

I give hereunder the current situation for the period November 2021 to October 2022.

As in my reports of the past number of years I again confirm that 7 years ago in September of 2015, our Association together with its sister organizations launched its online version of <u>OUR GAMES - OUR CODE</u>, the joint <u>CODE OF BEST PRACTICE IN YOUTH SPORT</u>. This Code has been agreed between the GAA, the Ladies Gaelic Football Association, the Camogie Association, GAA Handball Ireland and the Rounders Council of Ireland.

The Code is now the mandatory Code of Best Practice for all Gaelic Games Associations who work with underage players. It is in situ for these past seven years and it replaces all previous Codes.

Our Games Our Code, the Association's own Code of Best Practise is by now a well-established pillar of all activities involving young people. The Code of Behaviour is but one section of the Code, and addresses the minimum appropriate levels of behaviour, practice and conduct required from our Young Players, Coaches, Supporters, Parents/Guardians, Referees and Clubs. The Code of Behaviour is a compulsory Code for all persons working in any role of responsibility with Children in the Associations referenced above and has been adopted by our relevant Central Councils and is in accordance with Rule. The essential issues relate to dealing with alleged breaches of the Code and the forthcoming structures to be put in place at Club, County, Provincial and National levels. It also includes the GAA Anti-Bullying Policy Statement.

Garda Electronic Vetting is now an ongoing process across the county. This procedure gives effect to the National Vetting Bureau (Children and Vulnerable Persons) Act 2012. which was the subject of a Ministerial Commencement Order on 29th April 2016. As a result of this Directive Cumann Luthchleas Gael together with An Garda Siochana both agree that our Association will be the subject of electronic vetting only. Since April 2016, a total of 7000 members of Meath GAA Clubs have been vetted in accordance with this new legislation. Some people have in fact been re-vetted as their three years validity had expired. These persons are now considered vetted for a period of three (3) years. Anyone engaging with children in a GAA club context is leaving themselves (and their Club) exposed to potential criminal prosecution if not so vetted. The process is quite simple and turnover time is about 10 days. I again strongly exhort all Clubs to be mindful of their responsibility in this regard. I remain available to assist any individual or Club in this process. The National Vetting Bureau (Children and Vulnerable Persons) Act is now the law of the Land and is the supreme adjudication on both mentors and the GAA as an organization in relation to our interaction with young people. Gaa Headquarters together with An Garda Siochana now advise that GAA members who are vetted from 1st January 2021 will now have to be re-vetted every three (3) years.

In the coming year 2023, All GAA personnel vetted prior to 2020 will have to be re-vetted. Each such person will receive an electronic invitation from the Gardai to apply for a new certificate. As mentioned already, this new certificate will be valid for a further period of three (3) years.

Since April of this year (2022), the method of Vetting has been transferred to the Foireann network and is overseen at Club level by the relevant Childrens Officer. Within Foireann the relevant Officer will have a full and up to date record of the current vetting status of each Club member.

All Clubs will be aware that a Child Safeguarding Risk and Asssessment Management Audit was carried out in the Spring of 2021. Similarly, the relevant Child Safeguarding Statement was compiled in respect of each Club. Likewise, this process was completed at County Level in respect of Coiste Na Mi. I am happy to report that all Clubs in Meath are now fully compliant in this regard. This process will again however have to be repeated in the month of March 2023. Further precise details will be given early in the New Year.

MEATH GAA HEALTH & WELLBEING COMMITTEE - ANNUAL REPORT 2022

The GAA Community and Health Department in Croke Park established a clear Action Plan for County Health and Wellbeing Committees for 2022. The Action Plan directed County Committees to focus primarily on four distinct areas: (i) Continued Development of the County Committee; (ii) Support and encouragement for clubs in the Irish Life Healthy Club Project; (iii) Ensure all clubs have a Critical Incident Response Plan in place; and (iv) encourage clubs to initiate and organise physical and mental wellbeing activities within their communities.

In addressing these four requirements the Meath Health and Wellbeing Committee began the process of bringing change to its County Committee. This was facilitated by the stepping away from the Committee of its former Chair and Secretary Andy Fahy (Ratoath) and Liz Lacey (Moynalty). The current Committee are deeply indebted to them for their great work, particularly as the concept of health and wellbeing was in its infancy.

While the majority of the Committee members are club representatives, the Committee is looking to co-opt more specialised personnel and to that end Carmel Halpin (HSE) has recently been co-opted.

In relation to supporting the Irish Life Healthy Club Project, Meath GAA has a very strong track record. Arlier in the year 12 additional clubs were accepted into the Project, bringing the total number of Meath clubs involved to 25 – second only to Cork. Committee officials have met with the 12 new clubs and plan to meet the other 13 clubs once the National Conferences are over.

Last February the H&W Committee held its Annual Gathering of Healthy Club Officers (HCOs) where 50 of the 59 clubs were represented. Presentations were given on the Role of the HCO; Substance abuse; Mental Health service providers in the Region; and Nutrition for players. A further, more detailed webinar was delivered by Dr. Aisling O'Donnell to clubs on Nutrition for Adult Players.

Croke Park are in the final stages of developing a new (more fit for purpose) template as a Critical Incident Response Plan. While most clubs have the older version in place, the Committee will engage with all clubs when the new Plan become available in January 2023.

The staple diet of Health and Wellbeing activities throughout the county is the myriad of events organised by clubs ranging from walking and fitness programmes, to Safetalk Programmes, to

Healthy Eating Programmes, to Family Fun Days. Meath H&W strongly urges clubs to maintain this high level of visibility within their clubs, which in turn enhances the health and wellbeing of their members and supporters.

FOOTBALL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

It was an eventful year for our underage teams across the board. Covid again had to be managed and disrupted preparations but a huge amount of work was completed on and of the pitch. There were some highs and some lows for our teams. After a tight win away to Longford, our 20s fell short against Dublin in Parnell Park in the Leinster Championship. However next year's U20 group has two Leinster winning minor teams and 1 All Ireland and we are hoping that the good work done over many years will bear fruit at the 20s grade, a grade we have not done well for many years. Our underage priority going forward is the performance of our U20 team. We are excited about the possibilities in 2023.

Our minors had a difficult start to the year, struggling in the group stages but finished strongly by winning the inaugural Seamus Heaney Cup against Wexford. It was clear that players and management found their rhythm as the year went on and some of the early games came too soon. There were many learnings and next year's minor group had a number of players that gained invaluable experience and development opportunities.

Working with Coaching and Games, we are restructuring our academy from top to bottom. Overseen by our outstanding volunteer coaches, academy work has continued unabated. These are seeds that will take many years to bear fruit. For the long-term, we bookended the start and end of the year with significant appointments. Barry Horgan was appointed as General Manager, tasked with constructing pathways and structures to help our players develop to their best ability.

Barry has world class expertise in athletic development. In recent weeks we have made our second appointment, Paul Garrigan to become Academy Head Coach with a particular emphasis on the football coaching that our academy members receive. The level of support our academy coaches and players receive will continue to improve.

During the year the football committee and Coaching and Games came together to present our new club pathway model, overseen by regional development coaches, that will give all of our clubs access to the expertise of the academies. We have asked clubs to pay particular attention to the appointment of football pathway managers whom we will liaise with and route guidance. In the coming months, we will begin to roll out detailed club, football coaching and athletic development plans that will raise standards through all our clubs.

We cannot emphasise how important it is for clubs to appoint someone of the highest calibre to the football pathway position.


On the playing fields the new Dioralyte Regional championship is a new critical piece of the development pathway for players from Junior and Intermediate clubs. Those players have not always had the same opportunity set as senior players and the competition, (at the time of writing), has received fantastic buy in from all with huge crowds and high quality contests

All passionate Meath men dedicated to the cause of Meath football. The future looks bright but they will need patience from supporters as they face the most difficult division 2 league in memory.

Underlying all the work is the generosity shown by Noel and Valerie Moran from Bective Stud who have given incredible support to help deliver competitive Meath football teams in the years to come. We cannot thank them enough.

MEATH COACHING AND GAMES REPORT




Figure 1: Primary school participation rate 2022

In 2022 our Games Development staff have been delivering programmes such as skills testing, TY Programmes, TURAS coach development sessions and formal coach education programmes, while the roll out of new initiatives such as Coach Eile and Caman & Play have been positively received in our schools. Our games development team are the driving force behind many of these initiatives and without their expertise and guidance, these programmes would be difficult to implement. Thanks to Christine O Brien for leading the GPO team throughout the year. Christines expertise and experience is invaluable to the development of these initiatives, as well as her constant support to staff when required. Unfortunately, the turnover of staff during the year continues to be a challenge and this has had a direct impact on clubs and in particular, primary schools across the county (see figure 1). As mentioned, 2022 saw a number of games development staff leave their roles in pursuit of other opportunities. In particular, we would like to pay tribute to Barry Teather as he moves back to his native county Louth to take up a new role. Barry has been the main driving force in our football academies over the past five and a half years, and the success Meath have achieved at minor level in 2020 and 2021 can no doubt be directly attributed to the consistent support and encouragement he provided to our coaches. We wish Barry all the best in his new role.




Figure 2: Predicted vs actual number of Cúl Camps in Meath




Figure 3: Breakdown of formal coach education courses in Meath





Figure 4: Breakdown of informal coach education attendances in Meath




Figure 5: Meath Club Nursery Programmes

We need all clubs to have at have at least one active Referee who is Fit and understands the Rules of the game, in the case that clubs do not co-operate we urge the CCC to sanction clubs as if we don't have Referees, we can't fulfil fixtures.

We had linesmen at all our championship games up to their conclusion and I would like to thank the Referees for their support.

On behalf of myself and the Referees Committee I would like to thank Ciaran Flynn and Denise Farrelly of the Juvenile board.



1368 games have been played so far in 2022 at adult level accounting for 32% of the total. Prior to the pandemic approximately 1100 games would be played in 12-month period. While the early season football cups were lost due to inclement weather, the major beneficiary was the newly created Premier football championship, which gave all clubs ample football for 2nd, 3rd and 4th teams. This competition was of a high standard and had a less walkover concession rate than the B leagues/Junior BCD championships at 15% as against 19%..Football and hurling cups in divisions of eight provided ample games until championship started. Football and hurling championships returned to normal with QFs restored

On the negative side 126 games in both hurling and football were conceded to walkovers accounting for 9% of adult activity and 15 teams withdrew from different competitions for a variety of reasons. The walk-overs were mostly conceded in the reserve football cups and division 4 of the hurling league.

The inclusion of the district football competition has been received very favorably by players and officials from Intermediate and junior clubs. The inaugural competition is currently being held under floodlights at Dunganny. Its long-term success will be judged by spectator enthusiasm and whether it can be combined with a senior competition.

As can be seen from the graph, underage and go-games continue to flourish and in 2022 accounted for 68% of all games played. Participation in underage hurling continues to show significant growth with 32 teams now participating at u13 level including new teams from North and East Meath. Well done to Coiste Go Games for promoting dual code participation as well as those clubs that facilitate dual code nurseries.

Adult Game Provision.

Meath CCCC are complying in as far as possible with national guidelines in relation to the provision of football and hurling competitions. Adult players are required to be provided with the following number of meaningful competition games during the season.

a. Strong Code – 16

b. Weak Code – 8

c. Dual Code-12- (In each Code)

As can be seen from the above 1st team and dual players in Meath are well catered for and exceed national game time guidelines. Players in lower divisions and Reserve team players are disadvantaged due to lower number of teams in particular league divisions. This situation is difficult to address.

Problems Encountered.

The major causalities of 2022 were the early the season football cups which were abandoned due to inclement weather in February. These could not be facilitated later due to the number of players involved in the U-20 and District football competitions.

The general consensus is that an U-19 football competition should be established as the next step up from minor but few counties have been able to integrate it as part of a fixtures schedule. In 2022 Meath CCCC proffered the possibility that clubs enter a complete U-19 team as part of the Premier championship and while 16 clubs expressed interest, none entered teams. So we are still charged that young players are leaving the game because the gap to adult football from U-17 is to great for most. Some have floated the possibility of restoring minor to U-18 provided decoupling from adult remained, and while this would prove beneficial for larger urban clubs, it would be crippling for small rural clubs who cannot field without their U-18s on adult teams.

Emerging Issues.

- Maintaining participation rates as players progress from juvenile to adult particularly in large urban areas.
- Number of rural clubs unable to field 2nd teams due to player shortage.
- > Number of walkovers conceded particularly in latter stages of premier football and junior hurling championships.
- > To many competitions for allotted time.
- ➤ Can an u19 football competition be accommodated in current structures?
- ➤ Possibility of having to play mid-week championship games in 2023 due to All-Ireland activity being extended by a week and the Leinster club championships commencing in early October in 2023.
- ➤ Players attached to county panels only representing their clubs in championship competition.
- > Recruitment/training/respect for and retention of referees.
- ➤ Social media/verbal/physical abuse of players/officials and referees

➤ Proposed integration of GAA, LGFA and Camogie Association to form a single association based on the principle of equality.

Conclusion

In general, most club competitions in Meath were finished in a timely fashion as per Master Fixtures Calendar. Planning the yearly calendar is always difficult when trying to squeeze a very busy schedule into the shortest possible time frame. With more games on the schedule in 2022 criticisms of overcrowding and too many competitions emerged.

Meath CCCC and Fixture planners are continuously working towards the provision of an adequate number of meaningful games on regular basis, at the right time of year. The aim of the CCCC Fixtures Planners is to streamline fixtures at all adult and underage grades to enhance the attractiveness of playing GAA. Ensure player welfare is central to our games programmes and put all the above in a Master Fixtures Plan.

Players and officials are happy with the current "Split Season" format where county and club players know in advance when they are playing and can plan accordingly.

COISTE MINIOUR

After Covid-19 had caused the previous two season to be abbreviated, it is a great relief that 2022 saw a return to a full games programme with the season commencing in March and will be concluded by the end of November with the exception of a single Division of the O'Reilly & Co. Solicitors U-15 Football Championship. The games programme provided saw over 1100 matches played to date while there are 8 games which remain to be played at the time of writing including 7 which are being held over until 2023. This figure excludes the 157 matches played in the Minor 7-a-side Tournaments during June as well as the Féile na nGael and Féile Peile na nÓg competitions organised earlier in the season.

Such an extensive games programme is fantastic to be able to provide for players in the county but it requires a huge amount of efforts from a variety of groups ranging from parents, referees, players and volunteer coaches and club officials. Each and every one of these stakeholders is pivotal to the organising of our competitions we are very grateful to one and all. In the current climate of everincreasing fuel prices, the commitment of parents/guardians driving the length and breadth of the county bringing their children to our games is one for which our appreciation cannot be underestimated.

As a county we provide one of the best games programmes in the country for players at U-15 and U-17 level with the number of games provided for players among the highest in the country. This is despite at U-15 level the discontinuation of the Cross County Leagues which ran for a number of years. Currently the Minor season commences in mid-March and concludes in October while the U-15 season commences on the first week of summertime and runs to the end of November. Getting pitches for finals in November can prove challenging and the committee are actively looking at potential options for bringing forward the conclusion of the season by 2-4 weeks. The feasibility of this while being mindful not to negatively impact the games programme provided will be closely examined over the winter months.

In my report for 2021, I highlighted that we had seen some unsavoury incidents both inside and outside the fence at our games. I am disappointed to report that while it is a relatively low number of incidents, we have had too many of these in 2022. As a county this is something we have to stamp out and there is no excuse for a game ever having to be abandoned for disciplinary reasons or for coaches or parents ever getting involved in exchanges which require reporting to our disciplinary unit by a referee. Where instances of this nature occur, clubs must take action to ensure they never end up in that scenario again with the offending individuals while our disciplinary body must not be undermined in their efforts to sanction guilty individuals or clubs.

At the time of writing this report, one competition has been held up due to one such incident and its completion has now been deferred to February 2023. The actions of a small number of individuals has caused approximately 160 players (allowing for clubs having small panels of 20 players each) to have their competition delayed. It is the hope of Coiste Mionúir an Mhí C.L.G. that this is the last time a competition at juvenile level is delayed in this manner due to disciplinary issues.

This though should not overshadow an excellent season on field in both football and hurling with promising signs for the future in abundance for clubs across the county. One of the highlights was seeing clubs like Slane reverting to fielding on their own at Minor level and doing so with great success. It would have been a good season to merely be competitive in all their competitions but they reached two finals, winning the League before putting in a series of good performances in Division 2 of the Championship. It is a brave step for a club to step back from fielding as an Independent Team to field on their own but in my opinion, it is a vital step if clubs are to maintain the sense of pride in the club and identity for their young players as they progress towards playing adult football or hurling.

On the inter-county front, there were mixed fortunes for our football and hurling panels. Coming off the back of winning the All-Ireland title in 2021, our Minor Football panel did not progress out of their group in the Leinster Championship following defeats to Longford, Offaly and Kildare. The panel and management regrouped and in the Seamus Heaney Cup they performed admirably and defeated Louth, Westmeath and Wexford en route to winning the competition.

The Minor Hurlers opened their Leinster Championship with a draw against Westmeath before defeating Down and Derry while defeats to Carlow and Antrim were recorded. They then entered the Peadar Ó Liatháin Cup and booked a place in the final when accounting for the challenge of Down. A Final in Páirc Tailteann awaited with Carlow the opposition. Having lost to the Barrowsiders earlier in the Championship, the team were up against formidable opponents but one of the best performances a Meath Minor Hurling team has turned in for years saw Meath earn a fantastic victory.

We would like to take this opportunity to put on record our thanks to Derek O'Brien (Minor Football) and Ger O'Neill (Minor Hurling) and their respective management teams for their endeavours over the season and wish Ger who is remaining in charge of the Minor Hurlers for 2023 and Stephen Morgan who is the incoming Minor Football manager all the best next year.

It has long been a concern of Coiste Mionúir an Mhí C.L.G. that we do not have enough schools in the county competing in Leinster Colleges competitions at the highest possible level. To this end, we are delighted to see this year that Ashbourne Community College are competing in the 'A' competitions at Senior level. This can only be of benefit in the long term to clubs in the catchment area of the school as well as the county in general. The higher standard of games our players are exposed to will only serve to raise standards across the boards.

In addition to the above committee members, Brian Mulligan and Paula Greif were of great assistance over the course of the season with the photography expertise. It would also be remiss of me not to mention Peter Meehan who is effectively an honorary member of Coiste Mionúir an Mhí

C.L.G. such is the number of times he assists us as a committee scanning tickets whether in Páirc Tailteann or our Centre of Excellence in Dunganny.

Three others who also deserve plenty of thanks are the wonderful staff in the office in Dunganny. Tara, Christina and Olivia are a rock upon which as a committee we rely on for assistance in a variety of ways and never fail to do whatever we ask of them. As a county we are very lucky to have them working for us. County Secretary Mairéad Delaney has also been of great assistance and her counsel has been greatly valued over the last 5 years.

After spending five years as Rúnaí of Coiste Mionúir an Mhí C.L.G. I am stepping down from the role but will be remaining on the committee in 2023 to assist the incoming committee. It has been a pleasure over the last five year to be secretary and assist in the continued improvements of the game structure provided to young players in the county across both football and hurling. There is a debate raging at the moment about age grades and I would urge all clubs to be cognisant of the impact any changes could have on our ability to provide the best games programme for young players in the country. If the Minor games programme is not decoupled from Adult then it will be to the detriment of the guaranteed schedule of games we are currently able to provide. Constructive discussions around this matter will be key to getting to a solution that best suits the needs of our clubs and county and hopefully this is a matter that will be solved through discussions rather than people shooting from the hip on social media.

The best way to positively impact on how the county plans for and runs our affairs is to get involved on our sub committees rather than using 280 characters in a tweet to criticise those who are actively trying to improve football and hurling in the county.
